

MARKET ALERTS

Brussel Sprouts: Supplies remain very limited due to insects, decay, and small sizing in Salinas Valley and Oxnard.

Cauliflower: Supplies are limited but gradually improving, with further gains expected next week.

Cantaloupe: Westside cantaloupe supplies are low, keeping prices high with mostly 9s; sizing is limited, with offshore arrivals expected by mid-November.

Celery: The market is strong with higher prices on valueadded items; large sizes are most available. Salinas production continues two weeks before shifting south, with Yuma starting in late December.

Grapes: Grape market is firm, with green grapes tighter than reds as the domestic season ends.

Lettuce (iceberg): Value-added lettuce remains in high demand with escalated pricing; production continues in Huron, Yuma, and Salinas, facing light weights and quality issues.

Lettuce Leaf: Romaine, leaf, and butter lettuce remain light, with romaine hearts very limited; value-added pricing is high, and quality issues persist.

Lettuce Tender Leaf: Supplies are very tight from insects and hail, expected to remain so next week.

Strawberries: Supplies are limited, with Oxnard peaking last week and Santa Maria winding down. Central Mexico is slowly ramping, Florida starts in 2–3 weeks, and Baja begins early December.

CROP UPDATES

Desert harvests are starting with limited volume and variable quality, keeping markets high for iceberg, romaine, and green leaf. Weights are light, and issues like rib blight and bottom rot persist, though conditions should improve over 10–14 days, with full desert transition expected around November 17. Spring mix and baby leaf remain limited, while early California navels are shipping with low brix, improving as the season progresses. Strawberries remain tight, blueberries steady, and raspberries and blackberries stable. Inconsistent sizing and quality are expected to continue through the next couple of weeks. Read more

WEATHER

California: Low-pressure system brings light rain (0.1–0.5")
Wednesday into night. Temps: 30s–50s morning, 60s daytime. Thursday warming slows; gradual rise to 60s–80s by Sunday.

Mexico: Cool mornings with frost through Friday, warming slightly this weekend; dry through Nov 9. Lows: 30s–40s, highs: 70s–80s.

Florida: Dry through Friday, light showers this weekend with a cold front. Temps rising: highs low-mid 80s, lows 40s-70s; winds 15-20 mph.

Arizona: Warm through weekend under high pressure. Highs: 85–90s, lows: 50s.

FREIGHT

All eyes on California this week as we hit the November mark, and the official start of transition from Salinas to Yuma begins. With an estimated start date of November 17th in Yuma, we anticipate shipper delays as product availability curtails on some core leafy items until then. Weather Updates



CALIFORNIA

A low-pressure system arrives early Wednesday, bringing light to moderate showers through Wednesday night, with rain totals of 0.1–0.5 inches. Morning lows will range from the mid-30s to mid-50s, with daytime highs in the low to upper 60s.

After the low exits Thursday, another system to the north will slow warming, with gradual temperature increases expected through the weekend. By Sunday, highs should reach the upper 60s to mid-80s.



MEXICO

Cool mornings with patchy frost are expected through Friday in wind-sheltered areas. Slightly warmer temperatures over the weekend should reduce icing risk. Lows will range from the mid-30s to mid-40s through Friday, rising to the upper 30s to upper 40s over the weekend. Highs will be in the low 70s to low 80s through Friday, warming to the mid-70s to mid-80s over the weekend. Dry weather is expected through November 9th.



FLORIDA

Dry weather is expected through Friday. A cold front will move through the state over the weekend, bringing a few light, isolated showers. Temperatures will gradually warm through the week ahead of the front. Winds may occasionally gust 15–20 mph through Friday but are not expected to be an issue.

In northern Florida, highs will remain in the low 80s through Sunday, with lows rising from mid-40s-mid-50s through Friday to upper 50s-low 60s over the weekend. In central and south-central Florida, highs will be in the low to mid-80s through Sunday, with lows in the low 60s-low 70s through Saturday, warming slightly to mid-60s-low 70s Sunday morning.



ARIZONA

Warmer than normal conditions will continue through the weekend under persistent high pressure and light surface winds. Highs will reach the upper 80s to low 90s in most valleys, with mid-80s in central Arizona. Morning lows will be in the 50s.

Desert Region Starting to Pick Up

We're starting to see the first harvests out of the California-Arizona desert growing regions, but volume remains limited, and quality continues to vary. Markets are still elevated on iceberg, romaine, and green leaf, as Salinas Valley winds down and production shifts south.

Weights remain light across iceberg and romaine, both in Salinas and early desert lots. Crews are seeing some rib blight, bottom rot, and seeder. Expectations are for volume and weight to improve over the next 10 to 14 days as harvests ramp up and temperatures remain favorable. Most growers are still targeting the week of November 17 for a full desert transition.

Spring mix and baby leaf availability remain limited. Yields were impacted by the storms earlier this month, and quality concerns are still being reported in arugula and tender leaf items. That said, some growers have stabilized with good color and texture reported in newer lots.

Valencias have officially wrapped up for the season. Early-season California navels are now shipping, though internal sugars (brix) remain on the lower end for now. We expect to see flavor improve steadily as the season progresses and colder nighttime temperatures help the fruit develop deeper color.

Markets on smaller fruit have softened slightly in recent weeks with improved availability, but pricing is expected to rise again in late December. Size curves are projected to peak on 72-count fruit, which could tighten smaller sizes again as demand shifts ahead of the holidays.

Strawberries continue to be the most challenging berry item. Oxnard is showing improved quality, but not enough to offset the sharp decline from Santa Maria. Central Mexico is picking up slowly, and Baja is still 2 to 3 weeks out. Expect tight fills on open market fruit to persist into mid-November. Blueberries are showing better supply with steady Peruvian arrivals and rising Central Mexico crossings into South Texas. Raspberry and blackberry volumes are holding steady.

We will continue monitoring field progress across the desert and keep you informed as we move through this critical transition window. While the weather is trending better, inconsistent sizing and quality will remain a theme for the next couple of weeks.
