

MARKET ALERTS

Asparagus - Easter demand drives prices up despite steady supplies from Caborca; expect a strong market on both coasts with good quality.

Avocado - Growers delay harvesting to boost pricing amid majority of fruit grown at higher elevations; short ripening times due to high dry matter.

<u>Broccoli</u> - Volume deals available as weekend approaches, but expect a potential shortage next week with rising temperatures.

<u>Limes</u> - Markets active as Easter approaches, with Mexican labor halted for holiday, prompting early harvesting.

<u>Oranges</u> - Markets active with Holy Week nearing; Mexican labor pause prompts early harvesting.

<u>Green/Red Grapes</u>- Demand for imported grapes exceeds supply; inconsistent arrivals keep market active until Mexican grape deal in mid-May.

Iceberg Lettuce-Limited availability persists; Yuma's production ongoing, Huron's starts next week. Increased weight reported, with some discoloration noted by multiple shippers.

Lettuce Leaf-High demand for romaine and leaf items; limited romaine hearts; fair quality with lighter weights, discoloration, mildew, and fringe burn.

CROP UPDATES

The Huron region in Central California is starting harvesting romaine and iceberg supplies, acting as a bridge for supplies for 3-4 weeks until the Coastal California Valleys take over production in mid-April. Quality is good, with insect pressure expected. Read more

WEATHER

<u>Arizona</u> - Arizona is expected to experience showers, dry conditions, and warm temperatures through Friday, with lows in the mid-40s to low 50s, and a cooling trend starting on Saturday.

<u>California</u> - High pressure will persist through early Friday, with morning lows in the 30s to low 50s and daytime highs in the 60s to mid 70s. Light rain may occur.

Florida -Tuesday was cool and dry, with gradual warming on Wednesday and Thursday. Expect slightly cooler temperatures and wetter conditions on Friday and Saturday.

<u>Mexico</u> - Light showers may occur over the weekend, but most areas will experience dry weather. Warm temperatures through March 23rd remain consistent, with morning temperatures cooling into the upper 40s to 50s.

FREIGHT

The Salinas and Yuma growing regions are expected to overlap with Santa Maria, Oxnard, and the Central Valley, causing trucks to make multiple pickups in distant areas.



MARKET ALERTS

<u>Cantaloupe</u> - Strong demand tightens market; good fruit quality.

<u>Honeydew</u> - Tight market due to vessel delays and lower yields; increased demand.

<u>Watermelon</u> - Extremely tight market conditions with demand surpassing supply; domestic season delayed until end of March.

Onions - Limited Northwest onion supplies, high prices; expect decline as supplies increase.

Bell Peppers

There is an adequate supply. We are past peak production in Sinaloa, so volume is light while we wait for the northern Sonoran growing regions to begin. Coachella will begin mid-April and reds will follow in May. In Florida, spring crops are starting to come on, some deals to be had, and the quality of the new crop fruit is better. Due to the high demand for colored bell peppers, Canada will make a very light start next week and then gradually increase its production to more consistent volumes by April.

Berries (Blackberries)

There is still a limited amount of product coming out of Central Mexico. The Central Coast of California is just beginning to scratch the surface, but it will gradually build through mid-April. The Georgia season should begin after Easter. There have been sporadic rain events in the growing regions over the past few weeks. It is still unclear how this rain will affect quality. Fruit from CMEX is being transferred to California and Florida DCs. The traditional observance of Holy Week will likely have some negative effects on packing and truck crossings next week.

Berries (Strawberries)

As crop cycles are trending downward, McAllen, TX should see a sharp decline in production over the next few weeks. Due to market conditions and quality issues, some growers are finishing up early. Santa Maria and Oxnard are experiencing an increase in production. There has been very little demand, which has caused markets to remain flat. As we move into the Easter pull period, demand should improve. Late last week, growers experienced a big increase in production just as demand was very light. As a result, many shippers offered volume deals to maintain inventory rotation. Rain is expected in Dover, FL on Friday, which could mean that Florida's season ends early. The volume will begin to decline next week with a lot of soft fruit and bruised fruit being thrown down.

Weather Undates



CALIFORNIA

The region will remain under high pressure through early Friday, with morning lows in the upper 30s to low 50s and daytime highs in the upper 60s to mid 70s. There is a chance of light rain beginning Friday night and continuing through the weekend as low pressure approaches the region. Temperatures will max out in the mid 50s to low 60s, with rain totals under 1/4".



MEXICO

Although a few light showers are possible into the weekend, they will remain widely isolated and generally light, so most spots should see dry weather. The temperatures will remain warm through March 23rd with little change. Most fields will experience highs in the low 80s to low 90s through Saturday. Over the weekend, morning temperatures will cool into the upper 40s to upper 50s in most places.



FLORIDA

Tuesday was cool and dry. There was a gradual warming on Wednesday and Thursday with mostly dry weather. With the next system taking aim at our state on Friday and Saturday, we can expect slightly cooler temperatures and wetter conditions. There is a good chance that most of the area will receive 0.50" or more of rain on Friday, followed by isolated showers on Saturday.



ARIZONA

Showers are likely to continue in the high terrain of Arizona today, but dry conditions are expected elsewhere. As the low-pressure area dissipates and moves east, winds will shift southerly by Wednesday, and temperatures will warm through Friday. Tuesday morning lows will be in the mid 40s to low 50s, warming to the low-upper 50s by Saturday. By Thursday, temperatures will rise to the low-upper 80s in Imperial Valley, possibly reaching 90 in the late afternoon. Saturday marks the beginning of a cooling trend.

Grop Updates

As we begin the transition from the Southwestern Desert regions to Central California, the recent weather patterns have been conducive for growth rates of the various crops. The Huron region of Central California will begin harvesting this week with mostly romaine and some iceberg supplies available from select shippers in the region. This region acts as a bridge for supplies for approximately 3-4 weeks until the Coastal California Valleys (Oxnard, Santa Maria, Salinas) take over production around mid-April. Quality looks good in the Huron region with some insect pressure expected as temperatures warm up in the Central Valley.

The cool, wet weather in Central California did not delay many plantings in the Salinas Valley. By most accounts, plantings went in with little disruption. Some grower activities (weeding, fungicide and fertilizer applications etc.) have been delayed slightly due to rain and the wet ground. Cool temperatures have also slowed general growth rates this season as light Cole crop (broccoli, cauliflower) harvests continue. The warm, dry weather pattern lately has allowed crews to enter stands as well as improve overall growth rates. Quality is reported to be generally good as the first leafy green harvests are expected to begin late this month. These early harvests generally tend to have smaller head size along with lighter carton weights and head densities due to the winter growing conditions

Quality in the desert regions continues to be a challenge as temperatures warm up and the season winds down. Insect populations are on the rise along with heat related defects including weak tip internal burn, twist/irregular shape and seeders, while also contributing to weaker, dehydrated texture and lesser overall shelf life. These late season supplies will continue to show some premature pinking along the rib that is not seen during harvest and tends to show up during transit and storage.

On the processing side extreme heat or cold can cause physiological changes in the plants causing leaf sensitivity and a weaker overall texture. This can result in increased mechanical damage and bruising during harvest and processing. Processed items will also likely see an increase in discoloration and breakdown showing up in the bag affecting quality and shelf life.

It remains very important to keep your rotations in check as the overall quality and shelf life of most crops, especially processed items, will be challenged.







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
